he annual Nebraska Admirals Association Christmas Ornament project was a highlight of the season for our military personnel. Starting in October, various members of the Admirals contact schools to help



make the Nebraska-shaped Christmas ornaments that have been an NAA specialty since the days of Desert Storm, when they were sent to Nebraska National Guard troop groups overseas. As the National Guard folks began being sent individually, their mailing addresses were no longer available to the NAA. With the USS NEBRASKA sub being commissioned in 1993, the ornaments were sent to their crew.







When the USS OMAHA LCS was commissioned in 2018, it was added to the recipients for the ornaments. Several years ago, the four veteran's homes in Nebraska (located in Bellevue, Grand Island, Norfolk, and Scottsbluff) were included in the recipient list and teachers all over the state "enlisted" their students to help make enough ornaments so that each service member/veteran would get one.

Unfortunately, this year saw a drop in the number of ornaments received, but the two crews of the submarine and veterans in Bellevue and Kearney (at the new veteran's home that replaced the Grand Island facility) were very happy to receive ornaments. Our sincere apologies to those who missed out on receiving them this year. The members of the NAA promise to increase their "recruiting" for next year!

Thanks to all the teachers, students and Waterloo residents who created ornaments! Schools in Kearney, Alma, and Grand Island all participated. Our goal number is 1100 ornaments! On a side note, Gov. Pete Ricketts gifted a special-edition ornament to each of the sailors of the Blue & Gold crews of the USS OMAHA LCS this year.




lan to set sail into Columbus for the 34th Annual Conference on April 4, 2020!




