A Conservation Minute:

In 1941, 47 acres of Penny Pines were planted in the only National Forest located in Nebraska, near Halsey. This National Forest is a unique hand-planted green island in the middle of the sand hills of central Nebraska commonly known as the "Forest in the Sand." The area known as such because of where it is located and the trees share space with cactus and yucca plants. In 2009, a dedicated group of volunteers planted over 255 pine seedlings to keep the area

growing and green.

Do You Remember?

September of 2019 marks 18 years since the devastating events of 9-11. The "official" poster used by the United Way, American Red Cross and Salvation Army to raise funds for disaster relief and memorialize that day was created by a 1991 graduate of the University of Nebraska at Kearney, Brian Niemann. It depicts an American flag hanging up and down with two stripes of "clear blue sky," signifying the emptiness of the New York City skyline after the towers came down. The black area at the bottom says, in white letters, "In Memory 9-11-01," followed by the ghostly outlines of four large passenger planes centered on either side of the outline of the 5-cornered Pentagon building with a gap signifying the damage done by one of the planes. At the very bottom of the black area are two small pillars, which could be construed to serve as a last statement, "Do not forget the towers."

A Nebraska Historical Moment:

It was over 100 years ago that the need for a continuous transcontinental highway to facilitate the transport of military and its vehicles became apparent. This year, in 2019, a group of rugged vehicles, including some antique military vehicles, made a series of stops along the Lincoln Highway, which is made up mostly of US Highway 30, from New Jersey to Wyoming. It starts in Boston as Highway 1, then Highway 30 all the way from New Jersey to Wyoming, joining up with Highway 530 into Utah, where it is named Highway 40 until it reaches Nevada, where it is labeled as Highway 50, becoming Highway 40 again in California, until it ends in San Francisco. USS Nebraska was the name given to the never commissioned Kalamazoo-class monitor *Shakamaxon* in 1869.


USS Nebraska (BB-14) was a Virginia-class battleship from 1904 – 1923.
