

From the Nonpareil archives June 19, 1971, "Passing Council Bluffs, the USS Hazard made its way up the Missouri River Friday afternoon, headed for its berth at NP Dodge Memorial Park North of Omaha. The Hazard was in the tow of Sioux City and New Orleans tugs to Omaha, escorted by several Corps of Engineers boats and several private crafts. All along the route many curious persons lined the shore to witness the Hazard's journey. These persons watched from the bank near the Peavy river docks."

The USS Hazard served as a minesweeper during World War 2. She was stricken from the Navy Register in 1971. The Hazard is now at Freedom Park in Omaha, NE.

This is the ship that started it all with 'walking the plank'! There were some Navy officers visiting Omaha, they were among the first to perform 'walking the plank' when they received Admiral certificates from the governor. The tradition is still used in conferring the certificates to those who have qualified for/earned the honor.

In 1931, Nebraska Lieutenant Governor Theodore W. Metcalf found himself to be Acting Governor for several weeks. To please some of his friends, he appointed 20 to 25 "prominent Nebraskans" as Admirals; hence, the Great Navy of the State of Nebraska was born.

A curious mystery is related to the Admirals, that of appointment of women as "Yeomanettes" in 1934. No information is known concerning them except that a few of the "appointments" have surfaced. Perhaps they were the results of attempts to recognize the Admirals' spouses, or women themselves for their own significant contributions.

It is believed that several hundred thousand Admirals have been appointed. Many Nebraskans and visitors to our state have not heard of our navy; they have not heard of the waves of prairie schooners that at one time plied our plains under which lies our real wealth---Nebraska's under-ground sea.


